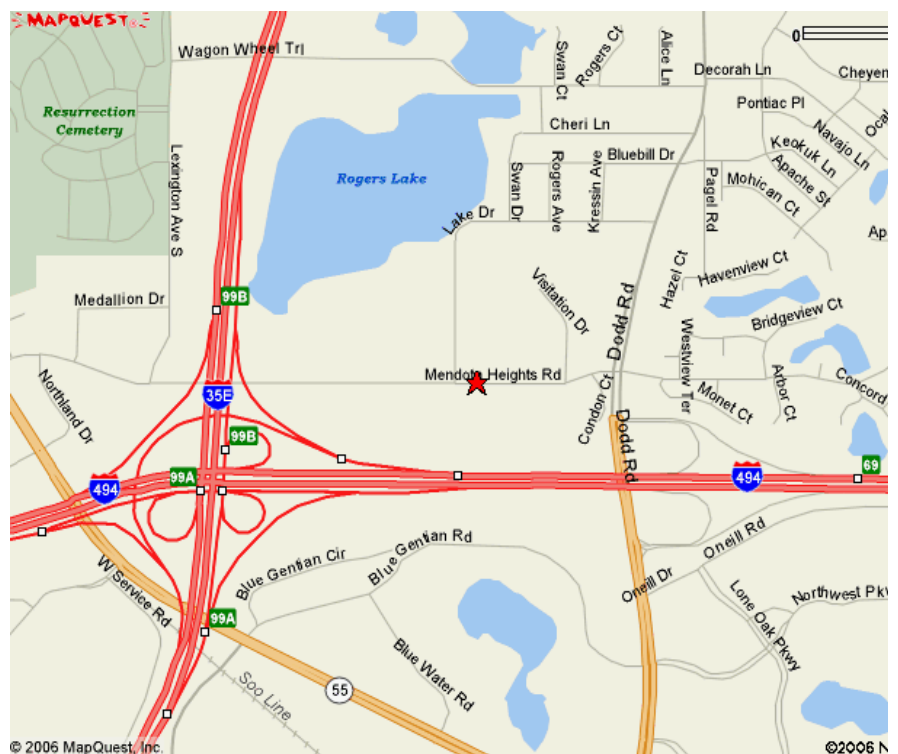

Class Handouts

We will not have extra handouts from class sessions that you could not attend. There will not be any copier services available at the University.

University Setting

The Spring University of Scouting is held at a local High School. We are renting the facilities for the day. For the day, this facility is also a Scouting Facility. We follow all the school's rules and BSA's policies, guidelines and procedures. Because of the size the NSC-U (over 700 people), the facility is large and may require you to walk from one end of the facility to another. This may also include climbing stairs. The schedule provides a 10-minute passing time between classes. We try to group all the classes of a college together.

Families at the University

NSC-U is an adult supplemental training event. We do not provide daycare services or other activities for those not working at or taking classes at the University. We do not have any programs for youth members.

Smoking

For fire, safety and school policy reasons, smoking is prohibited throughout the school building and grounds. If you need to smoke, please do so only off the school grounds. This includes the parking lot.

Degree Program

Requirements for the non-accredited degrees in the College of Cub Scouting, Boy Scouting, Venturing, General Scouting and College of Graduate Studies are as follows:

BACHELOR'S DEGREE *first year*

Awarded upon completion of six (6) class sessions of training not spanning more than two (2) consecutive years (either as a student and/or as an instructor or staff).

MASTERS DEGREE *second year*

Awarded upon completion of six (6) class sessions after obtaining a Bachelors Degree (a total of 12 classes), not spanning more than two (2) consecutive years (either as a student and/or instructor or staff).

DOCTOR DEGREE *third & fourth years*

Awarded upon completion of at least twelve (12) class sessions after obtaining a Masters Degree (either as a student and/or instructor), a minimum total of 24 class sessions. Other requirements include: completion of course The Doctoral Project & Degree from the College of Graduate Studies, completion of the Doctoral Project programs as prescribed in the above courses, be an instructor for at least two (2) classes (one each year) or on staff (for two years), and attending at least four (4) class sessions (either as a student and/or an instructor or staff) during the year of awarding the Doctor Degree.

Class offerings are organized by BSA program areas; Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, and Venturing. We also provide classes in General Scouting on topics that leaders from all program areas will find helpful. The College of Graduate Studies is for those Scouters having completed the Masters Degree and wants to start work on their Doctoral Degree.

Course #	Course Name	Course Description
CS101	Planning: The Cornerstone to a Quality Program	Learn how to plan and fund a fun, exciting annual program. Build on monthly themes, district & council events, and other planning resources to deliver the promise of cub scouting and be a "Quality Unit."
CS103	How to Find 'em and Keep 'em: Recruiting Cub Scouts and Leaders	While "boy talks" and flier distribution in schools has been the mainstay of recruiting, packs can no longer depend on these as their sole recruiting method. Nor can they afford to lose the interest of boys and parents who have already joined. This session will discuss creative methods, best practices and other tips to improve your pack's success in recruiting and retaining boys and adults.
CS104	Cub Scouting and its Outdoor Program	Who says Cubs Scouts don't go camping? Learn about camping and other outdoor activities to get your boys outside. And keep the "outing" in Cub Scouting year-round!
